JOHN THE APOSTLE & GOSPEL WRITER



Over the next few months, I will be writing about our gospel writers in the Olive Press. I have chosen John first because I feel he was the closest to Christ--even closer than Peter. From the cross, Christ told John to take care of his mother, and John took care of his Mary. John describes himself as the disciple whom Jesus loved.

Luther says that John wrote his Gospel because the Heretic Cerinthus (a contemporary of the Apostles) was the first man to attack the divinity of Christ. John's gospel proves that Christ, our Lord and Savior, is the true, natural and eternal God with the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. John's gospels differ from the Synoptic Gospels in several ways. The Gospel of John covers a different time span than Matthew, Mark and Luke. The Gospel of John portrays Jesus discoursing at length on logical matters.

NEW TESTAMENT ACCOUNTS

John was the son of Zebedee and Salome, and the brother of James the Greater. In the Gospels, the two brothers are often called after their father the "sons of Zebedee" and received from Christ the honorable title of Boanerges, i.e. "sons of thunder" (Mark 3:17). Originally, they were fishermen and fished with their father in the Lake of Gennesaret. Many speculate the probable explanation that the brothers served as disciples of John the Baptist for a time and were called by Christ from the circle of John's followers, together with Peter and Andrew, to become His disciples (John 1:35-42). The first disciples returned with their new Master from the Jordan River to Galilee, and both John and the others remained for some time with Jesus. Yet after the second return from Judea, John and his companions went back again to their trade of fishing until he and they were called by Christ to definitive discipleship (Matthew 4:18-22; Mark 1:16-20). In the lists of the Apostles, John has the second place (Acts 1:13), the third (Mark 3:17), and the fourth (Matthew 10:3; Luke 6:14), yet always after James with the exception of a few passages (Luke 8:51; 9:28 in the Greek text; Acts 1:13).

From James being thus placed first, the conclusion is drawn that John was the younger of the two brothers. In any case, John had a prominent position in the apostolic body. Peter, James, and he were the only witnesses of the raising of Jairus's daughter (Mark 5:37), of the Transfiguration (Matthew 17:1), and of the Agony in Gethsemane (Matthew 26:37).

Only he and Peter were sent into the city to make the preparation for the Last Supper (Luke 22:8). At the Supper itself, his place was next to Christ on whose breast he leaned (John 13:23, 25). According to the general interpretation, John was also that "other disciple" who with Peter followed Christ after the arrest into the palace of a high priest (John 18:15). John alone remained near his beloved Master at the foot of the Cross on Calvary with the Mother of Jesus and the pious women, and took the desolate Mother into his care as the last legacy of Christ (John 19:25-27). After the Resurrection, John and Peter were the first of the disciples to hasten to the grave, and he was the first to believe that Christ had truly risen (John 21:7). The Fourth Evangelist has shown us most clearly how close the relationship was between John and his Lord and Master, by using the title he is accustomed to indicate himself without giving his name: "the disciple whom Jesus loved." After Christ's Ascension and the Descent of the Holy Spirit, John took, together with Peter, a prominent part in the founding and guidance of the Church. We see him in the company of Peter at the healing of the lame man in the Temple (Acts 3:1) With Peter he is also thrown into prison (Acts 4:3).

THE LATER ACCOUNTS OF JOHN

The Christian writers of the second and third centuries testify to us a tradition universally recognized and doubted by no one that the Apostle and Evangelist John lived in Asia Minor in the last decades of the first century, and from Ephesus had guided the Churches of that province. In his "Dialogue with Trypho" (Chapter 81), St. Justin Martyr refers to "John, one of the Apostles of Christ" as a witness who had lived with us", that is, at Ephesus. St. Irenaeus speaks in many places of the Apostle John and his residence in Asia and expressly declares that he wrote his Gospel at Ephesus (Adv. Her., III, I, 1), and lived there until the reign of Trajan (loc. Cit., II, xxii, 5). Considering Eusebius (Hist.eccl., III, xii, 1) and others, we are obliged to place the Apostle's banishment to Patmos in the reign of the Emperor Domitian (81-96). Previous to this, according to Tertullian's testimony (De praescript., xxxvi), John had been thrown into a cauldron of boiling oil before the Porta Latina at Rome without suffering injury. After Domitian's death, the Apostle returned to Ephesus during the reign of Trajan, and at Ephesus he died about A.D. 100 at a great age.

THE OLD HAS GONE, THE NEW IS HERE!



With 2024 coming to an end, it is time to embrace the coming of the New Year, but to also be grateful for what the old year has given us. Think about what goals we all have accomplished in our lives last year: personal, professional, or even spiritual ones. Setting new goals and accomplishing them is a part of life, and it is especially common during this time of year with people making a list of New Year's Resolutions. By doing a simple Google search, what appeared on the most common resolutions amongst people included better health, being more frugal on finances, having more work-life balance, and spending more time with loved ones. Just remember, however, that even though it is important and good to have and accomplish goals, it is even better that they are aligned with the will of God.

Ephesians 4:22-24 states “[y]ou were taught, with regard to your former way of life, to put off your old self, which is being corrupted by its deceitful desires; to be made new in the attitude of your minds; and to put on the new self, created to be like God in true righteousness and holiness.” This should be a reminder to all of us that whatever we do and achieve this year, God’s glory should be at the center of why we want to accomplish these goals! Jesus came down and died for us so that we can be made new by being freed from the slavery of sin. In that case, what would

be the point of accomplishing new goals, that could be life changing, if we did not recognize that Jesus’ resurrection gave the whole world a chance to repent and change?

The transition from the old year to the new year is also a perfect metaphor for Jesus’ birth, not just his death. The birth of a newborn king, the king of kings, was to bring hope and ultimately change the world forever. Christ is the new creation, as written in 2 Corinthians 5:17:

“Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: The old has gone, the new is here!” Jesus is not only the reason for the (Christmas) season, but **He is the reason for us to change, become better, and have new beginnings!**”

So, when we think about writing down or thinking about any New Year’s Resolutions for 2025, let the Holy Spirit guide you on whether they are biblical and righteous.

We can appreciate the lessons that the old year has taught us and apply them this year. Let's all step out in faith this year and remember to...

"Commit to the Lord whatever you do, and your plans will succeed"
Proverbs 16:3

January 6th is the Feast of the Epiphany and marks the beginning of the season of Epiphany in the Church. Epiphany comes from the Greek word “epiphaneia,” which means “appearance” or “manifestation.” During this season we celebrate the appearance of Jesus in the world as God and man.

Epiphany is the second oldest celebration in the Church, next to Easter. For centuries it has been described as the Gentile Christmas. This is because Epiphany marks the arrival of the Wise Men from the east — Gentiles (people who aren’t of Jewish descent) who have come to worship the true King. We aren’t told exactly where they came from, but they possibly came from Babylon.

With the arrival of the Wise Men, we are reminded Jesus came to save all people. In Christ you and I are united as one. As Galatians 3:28 says, “There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free, there is no male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus.”

We see the arrival of the Wise Men (also called the Magi) in the Gospel according to St. Matthew:

“And behold, the star that they had seen when it rose went before them until it came to rest over the place where the child was. When they saw the star, they rejoiced exceedingly with great joy.

*And going into the house,
they saw the child with Mary
His mother, and they fell
down and worshiped him.
Then, opening their treasures,
**they offered Him gifts, gold
and frankincense and myrrh.**
And being warned in a
dream not to return to Herod,
they departed to their own
country by another way”*

Matthew 2:9–12

These Wise Men followed the Star of Bethlehem to find the Christ Child. The Wise Men had first arrived in Jerusalem looking for Jesus, but when they did not find Him there, they traveled to Bethlehem to seek Him. Now, we are not exactly sure when the Wise Men arrived to see Jesus. It is possible they arrived when Jesus was around two years old, because King Herod, in fear of losing his position as king, killed male infants two years old and younger (Matthew 2:13–16).

Light is a common theme throughout the season of Epiphany, because the Wise Men followed the light of a star to find Jesus, the true light of the world. Christ shines in our darkness, and the darkness has not overcome His light (John 1:5).
